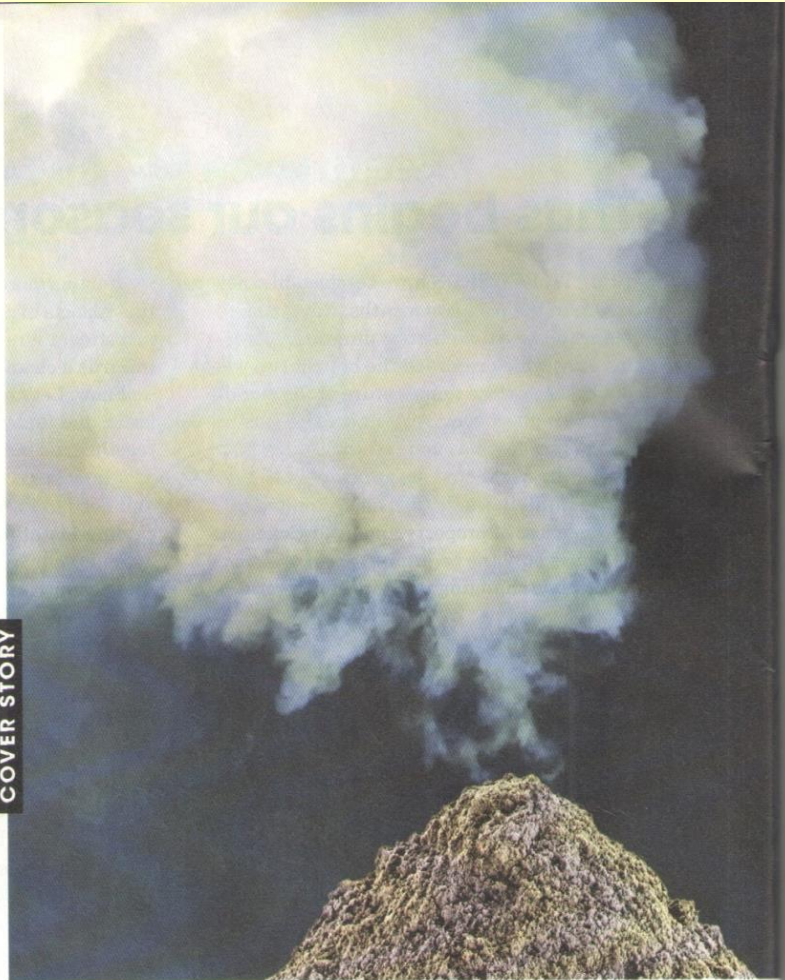

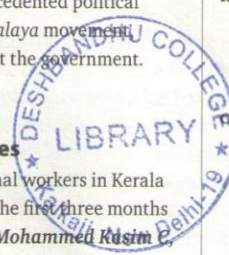

Non-beneficiary Tenant Farming under the RBS

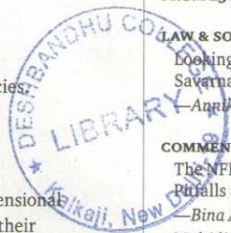

54 Farmer profitability, cost of food production, and associated issues of nutri-cereals are analysed in this paper by leveraging a large database spanning a 35-year period. The skewed food policies being followed in India are also highlighted.
